40PARTICIPATION IN MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS VIA COMMUNICATIONS MEDIA TECHNOLOGY

This Policy describes the circumstances under which a Commissioner may participate in a meeting of the Board of Commissioners ("Board") or a committee thereof through the use of communications media technology, without being physically present for the meeting. Communications media technology, for purposes of this Policy includes electronic transmission of printed matter, audio, full-motion video, freeze-frame video, compressed video, and digital video by any method available. As discussed further below, a Commissioner may only be permitted to participate in a meeting via communications media technology when extraordinary circumstances exist that prevent the Commissioner from being physically present at the meeting in question.

A Commissioner may participate in any meeting of the Board, or a committee thereof, including casting votes on matters before the Board, only when all of the following requirements are met:

- A. A quorum of the Commissioners is physically present at the site of the meeting. Any Commissioner attending via electronic media technology may not be counted towards establishing a quorum for the meeting.
- B. All participants attending the meeting (Commissioners, staff, and the public) are able to hear and be heard by the Commissioner attending the meeting via communications media technology.
- C. Extraordinary circumstances exist that prevent the Commissioner proposing to attend the meeting via communications media technology from being physically present at the meeting. "Extraordinary circumstances" for purposes of this Policy includes one or more of the following:
 - 1. Hospitalization of the Commissioner or an "immediate family member" (as outlined in the Bereavement Policy of the Employee Handbook, page 4-32) of the Commissioner;
 - 2. Injury or Illness, including an illness that is contagious, that prevents the Commissioner from leaving home to attend the meeting, or injury or illness of a Commissioner's "immediate family member" (as outlined in the Bereavement Policy of the Employee Handbook, page 4-32) who must be cared for by the Commissioner;
 - 3. Death of an "immediate family member" (as outlined in the Bereavement Policy of the Employee Handbook, page 4-32) of the Commissioner.
 - 4. Physically Disabled Member
 - 5. Such other circumstances as are described in a written request by a Commissioner to the Board asking permission to participate in a meeting via communications media technology.

If a Commissioner makes a request pursuant to number 5 above the request will be the first item for consideration on the agenda of the meeting the Commissioner seeks to attend through use of communications media technology. If the Board present at the meeting determines, through majority vote, that the circumstances described in the written request are extraordinary, then the request will be granted and the Commissioner will be permitted to participate in the meeting through use of communications media technology.

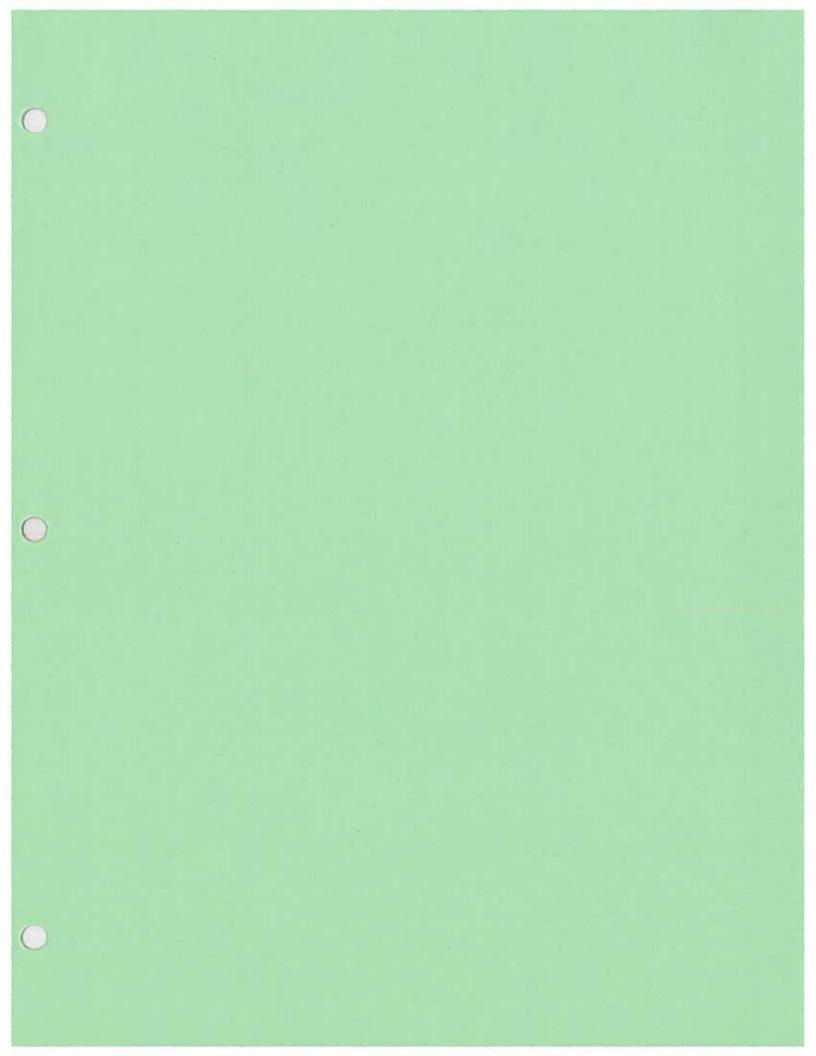

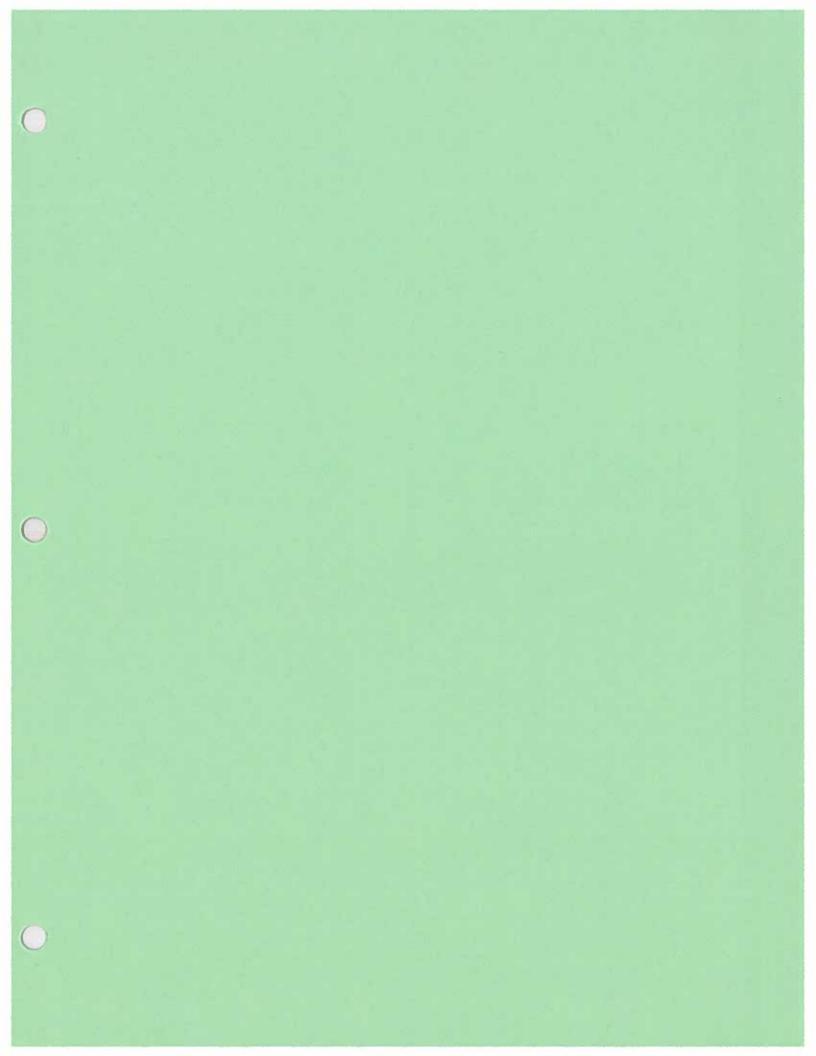

- ➤ Ms. Klein presented her PowerPoint with information for the audit period ending September 30, 2017. The letter, given to Commissioners this evening, is communication required by the auditor standards. AMCD's financial statements represent fairly in all material standards. There were no control deficiencies. This was a record year for mosquito control due to the two hurricanes Matthew and Irma, with a 1.1 million dollar increases in expenditures, such as, personnel and double the chemical. It was discussed that 2.2 million dollars in reserves was adequate. It was also noted that if the extra \$25,000 in exemptions is put on the ballot and passed, AMCD would lose thousands of dollars of revenue.

<u>Item 2</u>: 8 Acre South Parcel & Research Property Construction Project Update Report ~ Mr. Bill Youker

- ➤ Mr. Youker stated they hired an engineer for the water flow situation and last week the water flow test was positive (same as in 2016) so now they can move forward. They may need a fire pump on the hangar; Building 800 has gone through review by the Building Department and it will be 7-10 days for permitting, building 500 and screened enclosures are moving into permitting, the other buildings are ordered. The chicken house (500) should be done late June 2018, building 800 is here, and 900 has a ship date of August 10, 2018. The project completion date should be the end of 2018 or the first of 2019.

<u>Item 3</u>: Aerial Committee Meeting Report and Approval of Recommendation to Purchase a Bell **206 used Helicopter** ~ Mr. Richard Weaver

Mr. Weaver stated the meeting was May 7th and they discussed the Bell 407 is not an affordable option so no down payment was made per the approval given at the February 15, 2018 Board meeting. The FAA Inspection was approved and the application submitted to FDOT. The hangar construction project was discussed, Mr. Peter Paul Leone reported there was a Bell 206 in Lee County that we may be able to purchase; Lee County should have all their new helicopters this week; Dr. Xue will call Lee County and get an update on the surplus status on the Bell 206's; Lee County may sell us one of three pieces of equipment needed with a helicopter; the committee went over the aviation budget numbers and agreed to purchase a Bell 206 from Lee County.

Mr. John Wallace, Attorney, Lewis Longman and Walker, entered the meeting at this time. (He didn't realize the start time of the meetings had changed this year from 6 PM to 5PM).

- A. A motion was made to approve the purchase of a Bell 206 helicopter for adulticiding and larvaciding from Lee County and it was not to exceed \$800,000.00.

<u>Item 1</u>: Applied Research Committee Meeting Report ~ Commissioner Jeanne Moeller

- Commissioner Moeller stated that the meeting was May 4, 2018, they are looking at doing more environmental friendly research this year, continue to not use Organophosphates or impact non-target species; this year male mosquitoes treated by radiation and Wolbachia infected mosquitoes are being put out in small areas for an experiment; working with SpringStar on AGO traps again; public media is needed on the sterile mosquitoes because they will be infused with iridescent dyes and we want the public to know and not be alarmed when they see them.
 - THERE WAS NO MOTION ON THIS ITEM

<u>Item 2</u>: Review and Update of Officer Election Law and Regulations ~ Mr. John Wallace, Lewis Longman & Walker (standing in for Mr. Wayne Flowers)

- Mr. Wallace stated he reviewed the Statute and it states you can't hold dual office so when a commissioner decides to qualify for another office, they must let go of their present seat. Commissioner Rock has presented her letter of resignation and she will resign as of December 3, 2018, per the Statutes.
- Other Commissioners raised concerns that she will be out of the country for three months (she stated she will use media technology to call into the meetings) and the time of her vacancy and the processing time of the Agriculture Commissioner appointing someone will cause hardships to the Board. Mr. Wallace answered the question of when application can be made to appoint someone and stated it did not specify an exact time but he noted that the vacancy of the position (December 3, 2018), not the resignation notice would appear to trigger the application process for her seat on the AMCD Board.
 - THERE WAS NO MOTION ON THIS ITEM

REPORTS:

- 1. **Director** ~ Dr. Xue stated all projects for the season have begun already. There were four (4) EEE positive sentinel chickens and these areas were then treated.
- 2. Attorney ~ Mr. Wallace stated he had nothing further to add.

COMMISSIONER COMMENTS:

Commissioner Moeller ~ asked what we are doing for Mosquito Control Awareness Week? Dr. Xue stated we will be doing a lot of media coverage for Mosquito Control Awareness week, June 25th to the 29th. Commissioner Moeller is handing out pamphlets for the Smart Device App, which will broadcast to smart phones and devices for push notifications in your specific zip code.

Commissioner Howell ~ introduced our visiting scientist, Mrs. Hui Liu, he explained he is Chairperson and his job and obligation is to maintain balance; he thanked the public for being at the meeting and speaking what's on their minds, and he encourages Commissioner Rock in what she is doing and the projects she is working on and thanked the aerial committee for all their hard work.

Commissioner Brandhorst ~ attended the Aerial Committee meeting (which was published in the St. Augustine Record for public notice) and went over the aerial budget.

Commissioner LeBlanc ~ thanked staff for their hard work.

Commissioner Rock ~ Open House is May 24, 2018, so she can attend, as she is Chair of the Committee and will be out of the Country from May 29, 2018 through August 24, 2018 and that all the public are invited, along with the beekeepers, gardeners, and aerial committee members and pilots.

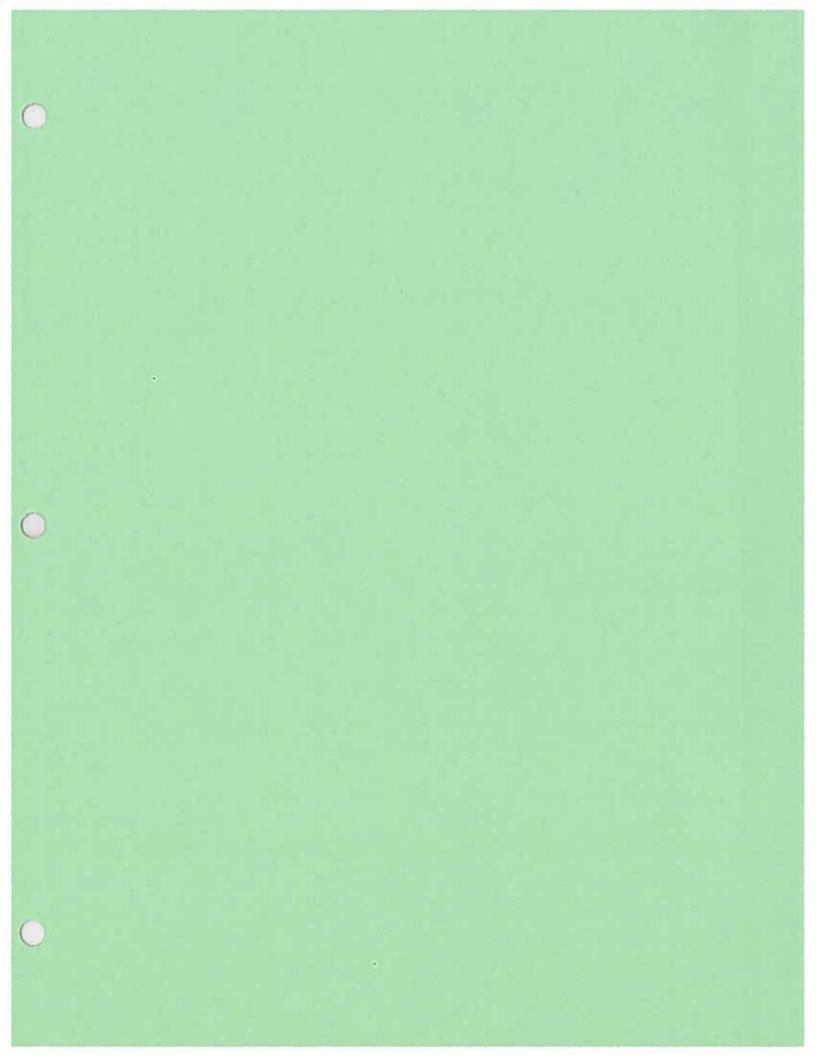

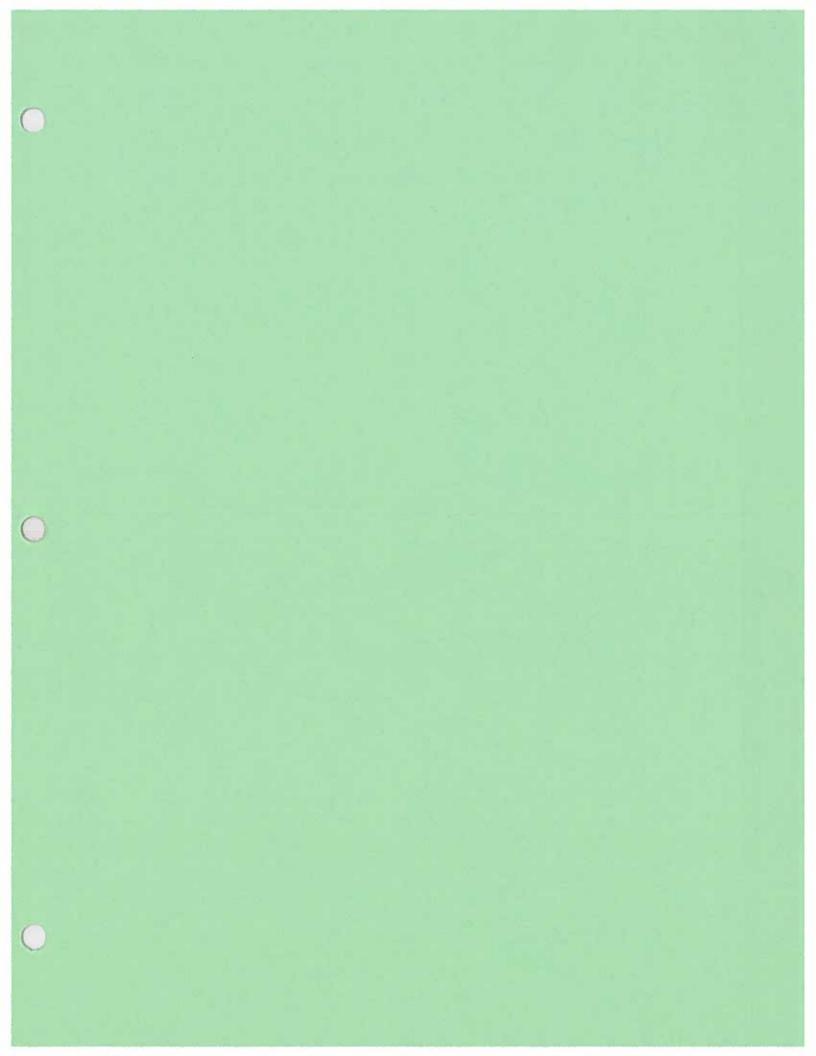

Updates from Capitol Hill visits

NPDES

The NPDES coalition is following up on our Hill visits by meeting with Senators encouraging them to add language to the Senate farm bill that will eliminate Clean Water Act National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) requirements for pesticide applications, as long as those applications are made in accordance with FIFRA.

NPDES language was included in the House farm bill that failed to pass last Friday due to controversial policy riders. We are grateful to have bipartisan support for our language; hopefully we will gain additional <u>sponsors</u> by spreading our important public health message.

Federal Funding

<u>Click here</u> to see the Senators that signed a letter in support of IR-4 funding. If fully funded, the public health pesticide program would be restored to help maintain and develop our toolbox.

After speaking to our group on what the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has planned for vector-borne disease preparedness, Susanna Visser and Dr. Lyle Petersen joined AMCA representatives at the headquarters of the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO).

We also sent delegates to the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials (ASTHO). When public health organizations align, we can optimize our message and use federal dollars more resourcefully.

Thursday and Friday, Sue and Dr. Petersen met with Congressional offices; perfect timing to reinforce our message that the government must boost funding for mosquito control, the <u>SMASH Act</u> and the Division of Vector-Borne Diseases in order to increase vector control capacity throughout the nation.

Endangered Species Act (ESA) Reform

The fun didn't end when we adjourned the conference. AMCA representatives met with the Environmental Protection Agency, US Fish and Wildlife Service, National Marine Fisheries Service, and US Department of Agriculture Wednesday afternoon to discuss mosquito control practices. ESA reform is a complex issue, but it is critical that we continue to raise awareness of "real life" mosquito control so our toolbox is appropriately regulated.

It Doesn't Hurt to ask:

A separate assemblage of AMCA royalty visited the EPA's Office of the Administrator Wednesday to provide an overview of our Association's goals and objectives.

We certainly made the most out of our trip to D.C. We raised awareness of our public health mission, covered a *lot* of Congressional offices, had to fantastic speakers, skits, timely appropriations requests, and coordinated with outside organizations and industry.

Mosquito population & EEE outbreak and our control strategy and efforts

Flood water mosquito population outbreak in our area. The major species of mosquitoes are *Aedes atlanticus*, *Ae. infirmatus*, *Anopheles crucians*, *Culiseta melanura* (*EEE vector*), and *Ps. Columbiae* (in south area). More than 90% of our CDC traps collected from 50 to 2260 mosquitoes per trap/night. Our sentinel chickens in 8 locations out of 10 locations showed EEE positive activity. So far there is 1 horse and 15 sentinel chickens tested positive for EEE. The numbers of EEE sentinel chickens are much more than last several years (1 EEE in 2017 and 1 SLE in 2016).

Due to every day rain, it is difficult to conduct ULV spraying and larviciding by aerial and ground. We have to conduct mass thermal fogging for vegetation areas during day time when rain stops. Also, promote public education for personal protection and empty containers in their front and back yards very often, at least once a week.

I will keep update about the control efforts for mosquito population and EEE situation.

Wet, warm weather brings mosquitoes



Wet, warm weather brings mosquitoes

Rain plus rising temperatures equals floodwater mosquitoes, and lots of them.

The Anastasia Mosquito Control District says sentinel chickens used to detect mosquito-borne diseases in St. Johns County have tested positive for the Eastern equine encephalitis virus, or EEE, in eight of 10 locations.

So far, 15 chickens and one horse have tested positive for the virus. For comparison, only one sentinel chicken tested positive for EEE in 2017.

Commissioner Jeanne Moeller told The Record this week the district has been conducting truck-mounted fogging in the most affected areas. She said the district is seeing infected sentinel chickens all around the county, but particularly in the area between County Road 208 and County Road 210.

Moeller said the district has been treating for mosquito larvae, where crews have been able to reach them, and treating for adult mosquitoes as needed.

In an email to staff and other stakeholders Wednesday, Rui-De Xue, the district's executive director, said more than 90 percent of the district's CDC traps were collecting between 50 and 2260 mosquitoes per trap, per night.

He also said every day rain is making it difficult to conduct ULV spraying and larviciding by aerial and ground treatments. He said the district will have to conduct mass thermal fogging for vegetation areas during the day time when the rain stops.

The Florida Department of Health last week advised it had seen an uptick in mosquito-borne disease activity in several counties across the state.

Although no human cases had been reported, the department said several horses and emus tested positive for EEE. West Nile virus and St. Louis encephalitis virus were also present in mosquitoes in Florida, the department said.

"The risk of disease transmission through bites of infected mosquitoes has increased," a May 22 release from the department said.

The department and mosquito control district recommend draining any containers or other objects holding water, making sure windows and doors have screens in good condition, and covering skin with loose-fitting, light-colored clothing and mosquito repellent.

The district also encourages animal owners to talk to their veterinarians to make sure horses are vaccinated for EEE and West Nile virus and that dogs are receiving heartworm medication.

There's also a free app for mobile devices the district recently rolled out that allows users to enter service requests, see fogging history and receive alerts from the district.

The app, by MGIS, Inc., is available from the Apple App Store and the Google Play Store. The district is instructing users to search for "MGIS" in either store, scroll down until they see the "EMS Utilities" logo (a white mosquito in a partial circle against a blue background), download the app to their device, and follow set-up instructions.

Tallahassee, Fla.— The Florida Department of Health is advising residents there has been an increase in mosquito-borne disease activity in several counties across the state. Although no human cases have been reported, several horses and emus have tested positive for Eastern equine encephalitis (EEE) virus. West Nile virus (WNV) and St. Louis encephalitis (SLE) virus are also present in mosquitoes in Florida. The risk of disease transmission through bites of infected mosquitoes to humans has increased.

The department recommends the following tips for residents and visitors:

- Avoid being bitten by mosquitoes and take basic precautions to help limit exposure.
- Be aware that emus infected with EEE virus can also potentially expose owners and other animals who are in direct contact with their feces, meat, organs, blood and bodily tissues. Please contact your veterinarian or county health department for information on how to safely handle potentially infected emus.
- Some wildlife can also be infected with EEE or other mosquito-borne viruses. Do not
 harvest wild game that appears sick, wear gloves when dressing or preparing meat from
 carcasses of healthy appearing game, and cook meat well.
- For information on how to prevent EEE virus infection in horses, emus and camelids (alpacas and llamas, etc.) though vaccination, please consult with your veterinarian, or the University of Florida College of Large Animal Medicine.
- If you suspect your animal has EEE, consult your veterinarian.
- EEE is a reportable animal disease. Animals suspected or confirmed with the virus must be reported to the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services, Division of Animal Industry. For more information about the EEE virus or how to report, visit the Division of Animal Industry website at, https://www.freshfromflorida.com/Divisions-Offices/Animal-Industry.

To protect yourself from mosquitoes, you should remember to "Drain and Cover":

<u>DRAIN</u> standing water weekly to stop mosquitoes from multiplying.

- <u>Drain</u> water from garbage cans, house gutters, buckets, pool covers, coolers, toys, flower pots or any other containers where sprinkler or rain water has collected.
- <u>Discard</u> old tires, drums, bottles, cans, pots and pans, broken appliances and other items that aren't being used.
- Empty and clean birdbaths and pet's water bowls at least once or twice a week.

- Protect boats and vehicles from rain with tarps that don't accumulate water.
- <u>Maintain</u> swimming pools in good condition and appropriately chlorinated. Empty plastic swimming pools when not in use.

COVER skin with clothing or repellent.

- <u>Clothing</u> Wear shoes, socks, and long pants and long-sleeves. This type of protection may be necessary for people who must work in areas where mosquitoes are present.
- · Repellent Apply mosquito repellent to bare skin and clothing.
 - Always use repellents according to the label. Repellents with DEET, picaridin, oil
 of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, and IR3535 are effective.
 - · Use mosquito netting to protect children younger than 2 months old.
 - Permethrin insecticide can also be applied to clothing and gear (but not skin)

Tips on Repellent Use

- Always read label directions carefully for the approved usage before you apply a repellent. Some repellents are not suitable for children.
- Products with concentrations of up to 30 percent DEET (N, N-diethyl-m-toluamide) are generally recommended. Other U.S. Environmental Protection Agency-approved repellents contain picaridin, oil of lemon eucalyptus, para-menthane-diol, or IR3535.
 These products are generally available at local pharmacies. Look for active ingredients to be listed on the product label.
- Apply insect repellent to exposed skin, or onto clothing, but not under clothing.
- In protecting children, read label instructions to be sure the repellent is age-appropriate.
 According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), mosquito repellents containing oil of lemon eucalyptus should not be used on children under the age of three years. DEET is not recommended on children younger than two months old.
- Avoid applying repellents to the hands of children. Adults should apply repellent first to their own hands and then transfer it to the child's skin and clothing.
- If additional protection is necessary, apply a permethrin repellent directly to your clothing. Again, always follow the manufacturer's directions.

<u>COVER</u> doors and windows with screens to keep mosquitoes out of your house.

Repair broken screening on windows, doors, porches, and patios.

The department continues to conduct statewide surveillance for mosquito-borne illnesses, including West Nile virus infections, Eastern equine encephalitis, St. Louis encephalitis, malaria, chikungunya and dengue. Residents of Florida are encouraged to report dead birds via the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's site www.myfwc.com.

We are pleased to confirm our understanding of the services we are to provide for Anastasia Mosquito Control District of St. Johns County, (the District), for the year ended September 30, 2018. We will audit the financial statements of the governmental activities and each major fund, which collectively comprise the basic financial statements, of Anastasia Mosquito Control District of St. Johns County as of and for the year ended September 30, 2018. Accounting standards generally accepted in the United States of America provide for certain required supplementary information (RSI), such as management's discussion and analysis to supplement Anastasia Mosquito Control District of St. Johns County basic financial statements. Such information although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of the financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. As part of our engagement, we will apply certain limited procedures to Anastasia Mosquito Control District of St. Johns County's RSI in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. These limited procedures will consist principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtain during our audit of the basic financial statements. We will not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance. The following RSI is required by generally accepted accounting principles and will be subjected to certain limited procedures, but will not be audited.

- 1. Management's Discussion and Analysis.
- 2. Budget to Actual Comparison General Fund
- 3. Supplemental Schedules Pension

Audit Objectives

The objective of our audit is the expression of an opinion as to whether your financial statements are fairly presented, in all material respects, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and to report on the fairness of the supplementary information referred to in the second paragraph when considered in relation to the financial statements as a whole. Our audit will be conducted in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards for financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and will include tests of the accounting records of Anastasia Mosquito Control District of St. Johns County and other procedures we consider necessary to enable us to express such an opinion. We will issue a written report upon our completion of the audit of the District's financial statements. We cannot provide assurance that unmodified opinions will be expressed. Circumstances may arise in which it is necessary for us to modify our opinions or add emphasis-of matter or other-matters paragraphs. If our opinions on the financial statements are other than unmodified, we will fully discuss the reasons with you in advance. If, for any reason, we are unable to complete the audit or unable to form or have not formed opinions, we may decline to express opinions or issue a reports, or may withdraw from this engagement.

We will also provide a report (that does not include an opinion) on internal control related to the financial statements and compliance with laws, regulations, and the provisions of contracts or agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements as required by *Government Auditing Standards*. The report on internal control and on compliance and other matters will include a paragraph that states (1) that the purpose of the report is solely to describe the scope of testing of internal control and compliance, and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control on compliance, and (2) that the report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the entity's internal control and compliance. The paragraph will also state that the report is not suitable for any other purpose. If during our audit we become aware that the District is subject to an audit requirement that is not encompassed in the terms of this engagement, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance that an audit in accordance with U.S. generally accepted auditing standards and the standards for financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* may not satisfy the relevant legal, regulatory, or contractual requirements.

Audit Procedures-General

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; therefore, our audit will involve judgment about the number of transactions to be examined and the areas to be tested. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We will plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable rather than absolute assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, whether from errors, fraudulent financial reporting, misappropriation of assets, or violations of laws or governmental regulations that are attributable to the entity or to acts by management or employees acting on behalf of the entity. Because the determination of abuse is subjective, *Government Auditing Standards* do not expect auditors to provide reasonable assurance of detecting abuse.

Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, combined with the inherent limitations of internal control, and because we will not perform a detailed examination of all transactions, there is a risk that material misstatement may exist and not be detected by us. Even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and *Government Auditing Standards*. In addition, an audit is not designed to detect immaterial misstatements or violations of laws or governmental regulations that do not have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. However, we will inform you of any material errors that come to our attention, and we will inform you of any fraudulent financial reporting or misappropriation of assets that comes to our attention. We will also inform you of any violations of laws or governmental regulations that come to our attention, unless clearly inconsequential. Our responsibility as auditors is limited to the period covered by our audit and does not extend to matters that might arise during any later periods for which we are not engaged as auditors.

Our procedures will include tests of documentary evidence supporting the transactions recorded in the accounts, and may include tests of the physical existence of inventories, and direct confirmation of receivables and certain other assets and liabilities by correspondence with selected individuals, creditors, and financial institutions. We will request written representations from your attorneys as part of the engagement, and they may bill you for responding to this inquiry. At the conclusion of our audit, we will require certain written representations from you about the financial statements; compliance with laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements; and other responsibilities required by generally accepted auditing standards.

Audit Procedures-Internal Controls

Our audit will include obtaining an understanding of the entity and its environment, including internal control, sufficient to assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements and to design the nature, timing, and extent of further auditing procedures. Test of controls may be performed to test the effectiveness of certain controls that we consider relevant to preventing and detecting errors and fraud that are material to the financial statements and to preventing and detecting misstatements resulting from illegal acts and other noncompliance matters that have a direct and material effect on the financial statements. Our tests, if performed, will be less in scope than would be necessary to render an opinion on internal control and, accordingly, no opinion will be expressed in our report on internal control issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

An audit is not designed to provide assurance on internal control or to identify significant deficiencies. However, during the audit, we will communicate to management and those charged with governance internal control related matters that are required to be communicated under AICPA professional standards and *Government Auditing Standards*.

Audit Procedures-Compliance

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement, we will perform tests of the District's compliance with certain provisions of applicable laws and regulations and the provisions of contracts and agreements. However, the objective of our audit will not be to provide an opinion on overall compliance and we will not express such an opinion in our report on compliance issued pursuant to *Government Auditing Standards*.

Management Responsibilities

Management is responsible for the financial statements and the accompanying information as well as all representations contained therein. You are also responsible for making all management decisions and performing all management functions; for designating an individual with suitable skill, knowledge, or experience to oversee our assistance with the preparation of your financial statements and related notes and any other nonattest services we provide; and for evaluating the adequacy and results of those services and accepting responsibility for them.

REPORTS

The Director Report (May, 2018)

Program Management:

- Customer and Professional Service: District provided 251 service requests. Dr. Xue reviewed
 4 manuscripts for PLoS one (2), Environmental Sciences and Pollution (1), and Pest
 Management Sciences (1) at the editors' requests. Dr. Xue reviewed 27 grand applications
 for FCCMC and DACS. AMCD staff hosted and provided training for 12 people form CDC and
 hosted Union county and other people visiting. Dr. Xue and other staff answered resident
 complaints about spraying time.
- Surveillance: So far one horse tested for EEE in late January and 15 sentinel chickens tested
 for EEE in 8 sites. We continue using BG sentinel traps to monitor Aedes mosquito
 population. A total of over 11,670 adult mosquitoes of 21 species were collected by BG traps
 and CDC traps. Major species were Aedes atlanticus, Ae. infirmatus, Culex quinquefasciatus,
 Anopheles crucians, Aedes taeniorhynchus, and other Aedes mosquitoes.
- 3. Operation control: District adulticided 42 times for 14,887 acres and 35 time barrier spray for 10 acres. Total dips of 4,560 with 645 positive larvae and made 276 times for treatment for 1,177 acres.
- 4. Applied Research: Staff assisted USDA scientists for release and collection of SIT Aedes aegypti and pre-treatment population detection for AGO and MosquitoMate projects. Applied research committee and collaboration with Navy scientists meeting was held on May 4. Intern students and visiting scientist projects have been started.
- 5. Education: AMCD held open house on May 24 and prepare for June media release and national mosquito control awareness. TV interview about EEE and mosquito outbreaks on May 21, 24, 25. Newspaper published one article about this on May 29. Education specialist and other staff gave teaching at Palencia Elementary school on May 5, South Woods on May 11, Otis Mason on May 14, 15, and 17, and home owner associations.

- Budget & Auditor: Board approved the auditoria report and received the renewal proposal at the same price for Board approval.
